Reflecting on 'Old Sheep, New World': a virtual event exploring historic sheep breed development

Nicole Gosling is a PhD student investigating the history of lameness in sheep c.1800-2000 at the University of Lincoln. This research is being conducted as part of the Wellcome Trust funded FIELD project, which is an interdisciplinary project investigating BVD in cattle and lameness in sheep and cattle (see: https://field-wt.co.uk/). Prior to beginning her PhD, Nicole completed an MA in Global Environmental History at Uppsala University where she wrote her thesis 'Making Sense of Cattle: A Story from Farm to Food'. Broadly speaking, Nicole's interests lie in the intersections of agricultural history and human-animal relationships.

Beth Clark is a research associate at Newcastle University, and public engagement officer for the <u>FIELD</u> project. As part of the project, she is exploring experiences and perceptions of farming, animal health and welfare with farmers, their advisors and members of the public. Elizabeth Sklar is Professor of Agri-Robotics and Research Director at the Lincoln Institute for Agri-food Technology, University of Lincoln. Previously, she was a professor at King's College London, the City University of New York and Columbia University. Her research investigates the implementation of AI-based methods applied to multi-robot teams, human-machine teaming, databacked decision making and behaviour mining. Her work has been funded by the US National Science Foundation, US Department of Education, US Army Research Lab, UK research councils (EPSRC, ESRC and BBSRC), Ceres Agri-Tech and a US-UK Fulbright fellowship. She has published over 150 papers in refereed venues

and edited two books. She is a Founder Trustee of the RoboCup Federation, former member of the Board of Directors for the International Foundation for Autonomous Agents & MultiAgent Systems (IFAAMAS) and on the editorial boards for the Journal of Autonomous Agents & MultiAgent Systems (JAAMAS) and Current Robotics Reports.






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Mansions of the Future: A public programme
